How is your casting in the wind? Ever thought it would be good to learn how to cast with your 'non-dominant arm' just in case? Are you, or a friend new to fly fishing and like some

professional help with the basics? You name the casting topic, from curve casts to distance casting and we'll get you a training session.

Your club has arranged to have FFI Certified Master Caster, Aaron Culley out of Cle Elum, come to the Walla Walla Point Park and teach a variety of fly casting techniques. Each group of 1-4 will be schooled, on one topic of their choice, during their 50 minute session. If you plan to attend, please honor the instructors' wishes, be vaccinated and wear a mask. The staff and students of the 2019 Academy would like to thank all the organizations and individuals for their generous support in donating funds and sponsoring our youth in 2019.

A very successful Northwest Youth Conservation and Fly Fishing Academy was held during June 2019. There were 21 well-behaved, enthusiastic boys and girls, ages 12 to 16 attending. All were a pleasure to be around. Each learned a wealth of information for use in their life as future conservationists and fly fishers. Many caught their first fish on a fly they learned to tie at the academy. Application for the 2022 academy is now open.

2020 was going to be Jim and my last academy. Jim has been involved for 16 years, I have been involved for 14 years and we are going to pass the academy onto 3 solid, dedicated new Co-Directors. John Gravendyk, Bruce Merighi and Carol Anderson, all from the flyfishing community and Pat Hesselgesser, Chair (WCTU), is also going to volunteer. The group has decided to attempt to conduct an academy this year, 2022 at Hicks Lake in Lacey at the Gwinwood Christian Center. However; we are limiting the applicants to 12 this year. We will be following TU National, CDC and local health recommended regulations during camp.

The academy is a youth education project of the Washington Council of Trout Unlimited and is made possible with the help and support of the Washington State Council of Fly Fishers International. Our goal is to open the door for today's youth to learn conservation and fly fishing, regardless of financial means, for any serious minded youth willing to do the work.

TU and the FFI have been the main financial source of support, along with some very generous individuals and businesses; we trust this will continue in the future. TU chapters and FFI clubs have generously sponsored youth to attend the Academy. *Editor Note: WVFF Donated \$300 in 2019.*

The Academy Steering Committee is requesting TU chapters and Fly Fishing Clubs to donate at the \$500 level. Enrollment fee is \$300.00 per student. However, it costs approximately \$1,000 total, per youth, for the 7 days. And no applicant is turned away because of funding.

The academy can be a life changing experience of our youth's attitude about stewardship, conservation, and fly fishing. The knowledge they learn about the abundance of life in our rivers, lakes and streams is invaluable and it is imperative that we preserve this event for our current youth so they become our future conservationists and fly fishers.

LOOKING DOWNSTREAM

Building any organization from the ground up takes extreme commitment and alignment of expectations from all involved. Whether it's a business or a club like the Wenatchee Valley Fly Fishers, success is dependent on specific goals and clearly defined action steps to achieve those goals.

The Wenatchee Valley Fly Fishers began on the Wenatchee River. On a crystal clear Saturday morning, I decided to spend a few hours on the water. For those that are new to the area, there was a time when the Wenatchee River was open. I moved to the Leavenworth area in 1980 and purchased a home on the river. For many years I had traveled over the mountains to the Leavenworth area to fish and hike. It was always a dream of mine to live on the river and fish for (primarily) steelhead from my backyard. Two years later they declared steelhead an endangered species and the steelhead fishery was shut down.

This one Saturday morning, I decided to head down river close to Wenatchee and fish some water I had never fished. I was working my way down river when I came upon another fly fisher and stopped to chat. It didn't take long to realize he was very experienced and knew that stretch of the river well. We had fished together for about an hour when he invited me up to his house which was located on a bluff above the water we were fishing. To make a long story short, this gentleman's name was Bill Barnett and the water we were fishing was known as "Bill's Hole". I didn't realize at the time how lucky I was to have met this incredible man.

Months later I was attending a Trout Unlimited meeting in Leavenworth and struck up a conversation with this person I was sitting next to. I mentioned to him that I wish there was a local fly club. Prior to moving to Leavenworth, I was involved with the Overlake Flyfishers in Bellevue. We had been involved with many projects around the state, most notably on Rocky Ford. This person shared my desire for a new club and we met that next week to talk about how we could make this happen. Enter Ray Bull. I told him about meeting Bill Barnett and said I would reach out to him.

I contacted Bill that next week and he was thrilled at the prospect of a fly fishing club in Wenatchee. We made a trip to the Tri-Cities to attend a Federation of Fly Fishers regional meeting. Our goal was to get advice on how to go about starting this club. The rest is history!

My love of fly fishing and fly tying has continued to grow over the years. My work and the years I spent as a single dad raising two little girls severely limited the time I had available to be active in WVFF. I am looking forward to being involved in the growth of the club and our sport once again. I commend those (most notably Gary Anderson) for keeping the fire lit and continuing the growth of the Wenatchee Valley Fly Fishers.

And a Little More about our roots by Bruce Merighi

Volume 1, Number 1, the first club WVFF newsletter was sent to members. It was called the 'Cast - O - Gram' and it first came out on February 1985. It was four pages of typed, as in typewriter, by Greg and Tori McEwen and Greg has recently rejoined the club. Yeah ! It featured an encouraging message from the new club president Ray Bull, encouraging the 29 'paid and pledged' members to each help make the club a success by involvement and hard work. "The board will provide the direction and leadership (my pledge), but it is only you as a member that can make the club work for you successfully. Be involved. Provide your thoughts, ideas, time and effort." (Editor's Note: My how times have not changed. 90% of the work is still done by 10% of the members. Oh, and by the way we are still really needing a Secretary.)

Original members, that are with the club today are Gary Anderson, Ty Duhamel, Greg McEwan, John Murio and Gordy West. By March they had 32 members and yearly dues were \$20. The Cast-O-Gram's quote of the month was, "The average fisherman has 66 pounds of muscle, 40 pounds of bone and 3.25 pounds of brains. That may explain a lot of things." In March of '85 they started a 'Name the Newsletter' contest which resulted in the first, 'The Fly Paper' being distributed that June. Outings happened up at Chopaka, the Okanogan, Yakima and Kettle rivers, plus steelheading on the Wenatchee.

This is the power of common shared love of something. And fly fishing is no exception. So my thanks to you all. You are part of my fishing brain and most importantly, my fishing heart.
