

SPOTLIGHT ON BEAVER DAM ANALOGS

What are BDAs? BDA is short for Beaver Dam Analogs. These wooden in-stream structures mimic natural beaver dams. These structures are hand-built into our local streams. Wood posts are pounded into the ground across the stream channel. They are then interwoven with branches. The resulting dam slows and ponds the stream water, acting much like the work of a beaver.

In 2022 Cascadia Conservation District installed 101 BDAs on private and public lands in Chelan County. Why BDAs? With current beaver populations at roughly 5% of historical numbers, it is difficult to imagine all the ways beavers maintained our natural landscapes. Commercial trapping of beaver began in the Pacific Northwest in 1811. Beavers are often thought of as "nature's engineers." Without beavers maintaining the riparian ecosystems, many streams are deeply eroded, incised, and disconnected from the flood plain. To help restore our watersheds, we are stepping in and installing BDAs. These structures immediately start to reconnect floodplains and jumpstart the establishment and growth of living organisms, that continue improving the health of our streams' aquatic and terrestrial habitats.

The benefits of BDAs include:

- Increased water storage and base flow which translates into enhanced water supply for people, plants, and animals.
- Green fuel breaks that slow or stop wildland fire spread.
- More wood in streams provides more fish habitat and thereby more fish.
- Leaf litter storage = increased food supply for macro-invertebrates.
- Improved nesting areas for waterfowl and songbirds.

Fish and BDAs! Did you know that fish grow on trees? It's true! Many research studies have shown fish thrive in creeks and rivers that have more woody materials—logs, root wads, and even full-sized trees! Along with BDAs, Cascadia installs PostAssisted Log Structures (PALS)

that mimic natural wood accumulation in streams. Our restoration efforts also include planting native trees and shrubs along the creeks where we have installed BDAs and PALS. This increased amount of wet and woody habitat immediately benefits the fish and other wildlife! BDAs Aren't Beavers Although BDAs can mimic beaver dams and help in restoration efforts, they cannot provide all the benefits that beavers provide to stream ecosystems. Beavers actually play an important role chewing down trees so that they fall in streams, creating more habitat for other wildlife. Their ponds often flood other nearby trees to provide valuable dead snags for birds.

Editors Note: The WVFF has participated in BDA projects in the past and hopes to conduct more in the future.

Central and Eastern Washington Smallmouth Bass



Banks Lake

This is a giant reservoir stretching nearly 30 miles south from around Grand Coulee Dam in central Washington. And it has absolutely tons of smallmouth bass throughout its nearly 27,000 acres. Since they have become established here, the number of smallmouth has never been a problem. At times there aren't as many trophy-sized fish as there are in other top waters around the state. The best smallmouth fishing typically gets rolling in about April and holds up well through summer and into the early part of fall.

There are several good access points, including the large Steamboat Rock State Park on the northeastern side and Coulee Playfield in Electric City.

Billy Clapp Lake

Between Banks Lake and Moses Lake and gets far less attention, but this oasis in an otherwise arid landscape is full of smallmouth bass. It's also full of rocky structure beloved by the abovementioned smallmouth bass. Fish the points and around the island. You probably won't catch the state record, but there's a reasonable chance you'll bring a 4-pounder to the net.

Potholes Reservoir

This is another big reservoir in central Washington, near the city of Moses Lake and south of the previously listed Banks Lake. Potholes is at the very top of many a Washington angler's list of best

bass lakes. Potholes also gets some love nationally, in large part because it has excellent numbers of big smallmouth and largemouth bass, in addition to several other thriving fisheries.

If you're targeting smallmouth here, look for hard-bottom areas and rocky habitats. Generally speaking, there is more of this good smallmouth habitat at the open southern end of the reservoir, including along the face of O'Sullivan Dam, Goose Island and various rock piles.

By comparison, largemouth tend to favor the shallower north end, which is chock full of sandy little islands and shallows.



Snake River

The biggest Columbia River tributary in Washington state, the Snake River is an incredible smallmouth bass factory well up into Idaho before it eventually transforms into an incredible trout stream. The Washington stretch is mostly contained behind a series of dams forming a chain of four reservoirs. Booooh !

The lower reach near the Columbia backs up from Lake Wallula, another fantastic smallmouth fishery. Pick your spot and go for it. Some of the tributaries also are viable smallmouth fisheries in their own right. We'd point especially to the lower Grande Ronde River if you want a remote river experience fishing for smallmouth bass (and steelhead starting in the fall). Put in at Boganz and float down to the Snake or from the Oregon border to Boganz Class 2-3 water but worth it when the chromers aren't in yet during the summer. You can do it camping on the banks, but check the camping regs first.

Lake Roosevelt

This massive, 150-mile reservoir stretching from the magnificent Grand Coulee Dam clear to British Columbia is loaded with smallmouth bass, though they don't necessarily get the same attention as the triploid rainbow trout, kokanee and walleye found in this multi-faceted fishery.

Chelan, Lake

You might think this massive and deep body of water would be hard to fish but with Smallmouth it's easier. Stick around the city. Fish the rocky jetties and riprap shoreline. Focus on the area just above the dam and around developments.

Moses Lake

There are a number of boat ramps but if your on foot the Lewis, Parker and Pelican arms of the lake hold great cover and shallower depths for targeting bass from the shore. It can be tricky getting a boat into some of these areas due to water levels and hidden obstacles. The northern end of the lake is almost always productive, holding large bass and walleye. Try Connelly Park and the shoreline near there, along with the North Lake Launch area.



Smallmouth Bass have been in the Lower Yakima River since the 1950's, when WDFW fisheries biologists thought it would be ok to plant these non-native fish. Ooops ! Since then, their populations have exploded and you can find Smallmouth in the Columbia River. The Lower Yakima from the Prosser Dam to the confluence with the Columbia River at the town of West Richland is ripe with Smallmouth Bass. The populations are thriving and averaging two ish pounds each. Catch one and save a few hundred salmon smolt.

They are in this floatable 25 mile stretch of the Yak and are very common with even larger sized, adult age class fish to be present. This is especially true during the spring months of the year when they will migrate from the Columbia River into the Yakima for forage and spawning purposes.

Treasurer's Report: John Richmond

- Club Financial Status
 - We have \$15,508 in bank including foundation fund, there is \$6,700 in foundation fund.
 - Foundation fund is coming back up slowly.
- 2023 Banquet costs and income:
 - Expenses: \$3,758
 - Dinner: \$2,255
 - Prepaid Raffle: \$2,135
 - Drinks raffle: \$1,221
 - Silent Auction: \$905
 - Live Auction: \$1,960
 - Net Income: \$4,718
- Budget 2023: Review
 - How much do Chairpersons need?
 - \circ $\,$ Income from dues increased slightly.
 - There was no line item for the Wenatchee Valley College class. Program money was allocated to the class.
 - ✤ College class, if filled, will bring in \$1,100 to \$1,200 income.
 - There was a question as to cost of fly tying materials. Steve asked if some of the fly tying material in the storage unit can be used. Gary said there wouldn't be expenses needed for tying materials but agreed to having \$75 in the budget just in case.
 - Income from the members' general meeting raffles were set at \$270 but that might be conservative.
 - \circ $\,$ Increased Casting for Recovery budget and FF Academy Donation $\,$
 - ✤ 500 a student cost 2000 to send a student to camp last year
 - Bruce Merighi said the amount can be reduced from \$600 to \$500.
 - Switching to FFI Insurance saved the club a lot of money. The yearly cost is now \$450.
 - Survey Monkey is going to be discontinued so it was removed from the budget. It was a reduction of \$200.
 - Website maintenance

- As members overwhelmingly paid online for the auction improving the website is a worthwhile expense.
- ✤ Budget was increased to \$2000.
- Expense for name tags increased to \$150 due to increased costs to customize and purchase.
- Post Office Box rental was increased from \$200 to \$250.
- Grimes Porta Potty was increased from \$240 to \$250.
 - The porta potty is on private property and there is no camping allowed and users must take care of the easement. Years ago, the club agreed to pay for the installation and maintenance
 - New signage at Grimes Lake may be needed in the next few years so adding the porta potty to the sign might be an option.
- Expenses for Outings was increased from \$300 to \$500.
- Storage unit cost increased from \$468 to \$560.
- Total expense last year: 15,908
- Total expense this year: 20743
- Estimated net: \$14,111.
- Steve Aguilu moved to approve the 2023 Budget, Gary Anderson seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.
